This newsletter serves as an opportunity to thank all active citizens for their role in making 2023 a very successful year for KPCA. We hope you enjoy our 2023 highlights.

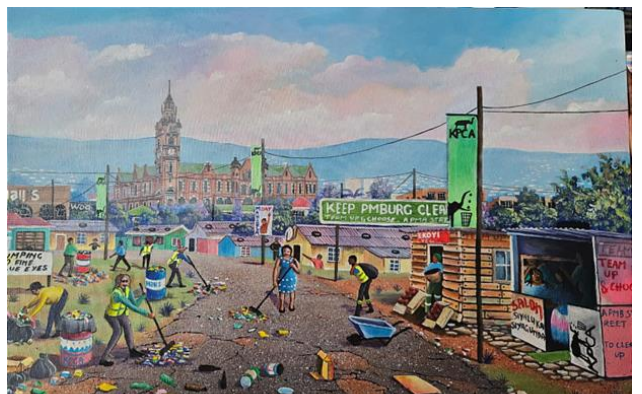

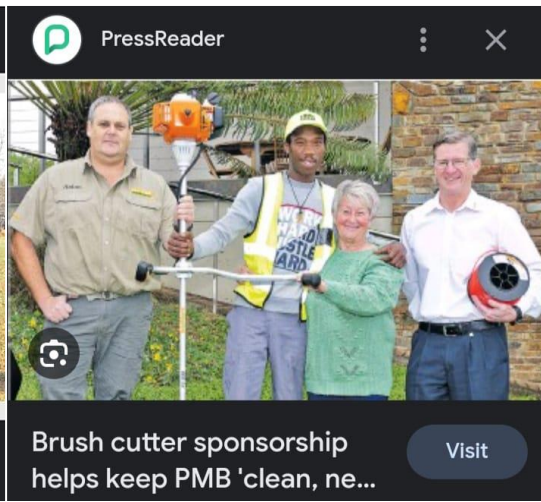
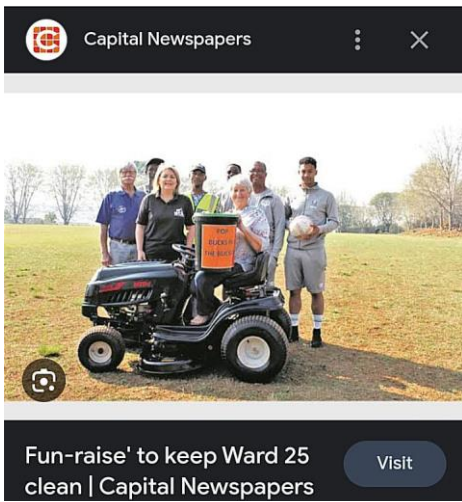

KPCA ACTIVATES Personal Power:

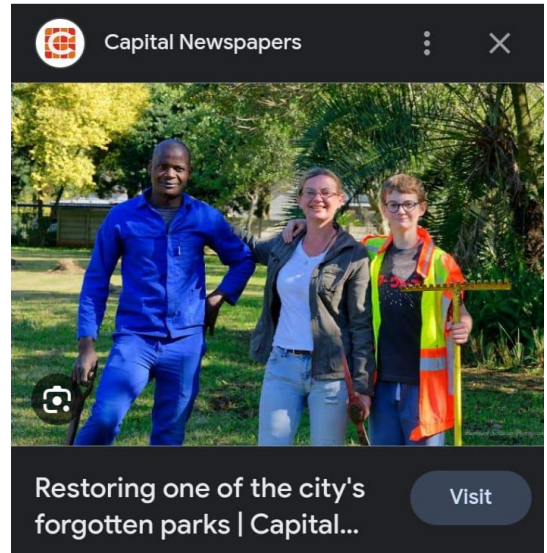
The focus of KPCA's 2023 Campaigns has been to remind citizens of their personal power, and to challenge them to use their personal skills, giftings and assets to help save our city. We work on the simple principle that if each household would maintain, clean and beautify their own garden and verge, we would have a beautiful, clean city.

KPCA ACTIVATES Community Power:

- We encourage collaboration to conquer difficult overgrown areas and other problems. Clarendon Community Association & Athlone Action are a model to follow.
- We promote household and community recycling.
- We support Individual and community clean-ups.
- We strive to identify giftings within individuals in our community and give them an opportunity to shine.
- We foster community pride and heart and look at how WE can work together to save our city and help other communities.

KPCA Community Site Visits and Liaison with Stakeholders:

- We do site inspections and consult with concerned residents/businesses.
- We help collate a photographic record/notes. This serves as a record of evidence and a baseline for the community to measure progress.
- We offer recommendations and assistance.
- We help to liaise with other stakeholders.
- We help communities hold authorities accountable.




KPCA's Mandate to Business - The issues in PMB's CBD are overwhelming. For this reason, KPCA chose to focus on one important road.

KPCA's mandate is to call business to rise and reclaim their street. It is a win for business as it is good for their brand, staff, customers, security, and property value. KPCA implemented the following plan of action for their 'streetwise' model:

1. Photographic tour of Victoria Road and social media awareness campaign.
2. Formation of WhatsApp Group of concerned businesses.
3. Meeting with concerned businesses and formulation of survey.
4. KPCA hit the beat to survey businesses and log issues in Victoria Road.
5. KPCA presented the devastating summary of results to interested stakeholders including business owners, the media, ward councillors and COGTA.
6. Businesses started to discuss solutions on the WhatsApp group. The first to rise was Foodpak who adopted the bins on the corner of Victoria Road.
7. KPCA made sure that business understood that while it was KPCA's duty to initiate and help facilitate a campaign or projects to get business areas in PMB clean, neat and green, it was the business owners' prerogative to own it in order to sustain it!

Looking for Victory on Victoria Road



Time for Action -

The Victory on Victoria Team hosted and sponsored KPCA's Mandela Day Event. Team-Up-To-Clean-Up came on board to help host the waste and recycling station. We challenged schools, business & community to team up to clean up and to give 67 minutes of their time to PMB. The Victory team joined the clean-up or volunteered to tackle other projects such as:

Hall's Retail hosted our station and donated coffees to all volunteers.

Bo's Plant Hire and Isibane Industries cleaned up a dump site.

Bolt & Nut Centre and Bo's cleaned, painted & planted tree islands & bollards.

Foodpak tackled the banks on Victoria Road bridge.

Express signs painted bins, cleaned off illegal posters and inspired their street to do a massive clean-up.

KPCA also filmed it to inspire the city.

Other Victories on Victoria Road:

A small group of active citizens and businesses have led the way in KPCA's Campaign "Looking for Victory on Victoria Road". We hope our efforts will inspire other businesses to team up to save their street. Imagine if we all did something. The following has been achieved in 2023:

- Adoption of street bins and a cleaner street.
- Removal of abortion stickers.
- Purchase and painting of new bins.
- Meetings with COGTA.
- Painting of #savepmb bridge by Siyabonga.
- KPCA arranged the clearing of the Transnet Line with the help of Glen Mc Arthur.
- We started a Victoria Crime Watch Group with security companies and SAPS.
- We painted the ex-substation yellow, a garden is to follow.
- Team members supported KPCA's Anniversary Ellie Trail.

Collaboration is key to success:

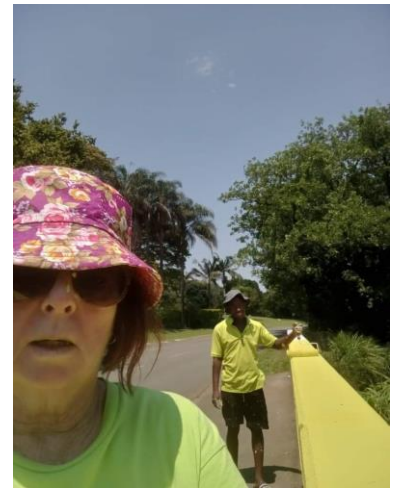
